# European Commission's experience with bid-rigging cartels

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Competition



#### Legal Framework

- No specific 'Bid-rigging' offence in EU Competition law
- Bid-rigging conduct covered by the general prohibition of agreements and/or concerted practices that restrict competition provided for in Article 101 TFEU
- No difference whether bid-rigging affects private or public procurement – both are illegal under Article 101 TFEU



### **Enforcement Context**

- 24 out of 56 of the EC's decisions since 2007 involve bid-rigging conduct, relating to both private and public procurement
- Bid-rigging is usually only one aspects of a complex, continuous infringement that covers a large geographical area
- Due to division of work within the ECN, the EC deals with international or european cartels covering several member states while NCAs deal with national and local cartels



#### **Case coordination within the ECN**

• <u>Example 1</u>: Companies in Member State A run a cartel on products/services sold in Member State A.

>>The NCA in A is well placed to deal with the case.

• <u>Example 2</u>: Companies run an international cartel or a cartel concerning cross-border markets covering more than three Member States or several national markets.

>>The Commission is better placed to deal with the case.



### **Enforcement Experience – 2007 to present**

- Since 2007 the EC has sanctioned 56 cartels involving 362 undertakings imposing on them fines of nearly 20 billion EUR
- 24 cartels involved bid-rigging conduct and resulted in more than 6 billion in fines on 155 undertakings
- 18 bid-rigging cartels were detected through leniency while 6 through ex-officio
- 14 bid-rigging cartels were dealt with under the normal procedure and 10 were settlements



# **Case examples – multifaceted cartels**

- Gas Insulated Switchgear (2007)
  - 11 undertakings
  - Nearly 700 million EUR in fines
  - Market sharing, minimum price agreements
- Power Cables (2014)
  - 11 undertakings
  - 302 million EUR in fines
  - Market sharing, customer allocation



# **Case examples – bid-rigging as a more central aspect**

- 'Non-aggression cartels'
  - Escalators and Elevators (2007)
    - 4 undertakings
    - 992 million EUR in fines
    - Project allocation with the aim of freezing market shares and fixing prices
  - Optical Disc Drives (2015)
    - 8 undertakings
    - 116 million EUR in fines
    - Sharing of intentions regarding bidding strategies with a plan to avoid aggressive competition
- Bid-rigging as center of gravity:
  - Car-parts cartels: Wire Harnesses (2013), Bearings (2014), PU Foam (2014), Parking Heaters (2015), Alternators and Starters (2016), Thermal Systems (2017)
